Technology Workshop

The meeting was led by Dan Sullivan. This month's 'round-the-room' discussion started with Bill Marr. Bill and his wife are avid bird watchers, and they would like to use their iPod to record and replay bird calls. If any readers can help with this, please contact a club officer, and we'll get the message to Bill.

Bill also told us about his recent visit to the Apple Store in New York City, near 58th and 5th Avenue (767 5th Ave). Bill got over an hour's worth of free technical support on his iPod, without any additional sales pressure.

Ray Polivka saw a man at a local computer store who had a five year old PC that stopped working. The man was upset because he had six years of pictures on his hard drive that he thought were un-recoverable. Ray told this person about our club's Upgrade and Repair SIG. Hopefully he will come to one of our meetings, and we can recover his pictures for him. Please don't let this happen to you. If you have any important information on your PC, back it up. There are a lot of backup methods and programs available. The best backup plan is – to do one!

Bob Morales had a problem with a new 4GB SD memory card – his digital camera claimed that it was unreadable. It was recommended that Bob bring the card and camera to the next Upgrade and Repair SIG, and the club will attempt to format, or reformat the card. Perhaps another solution would be to bring the card and camera to the Digital Photography SIG.

I listed a number of Internet bargain sites in last month's newsletter. This month Lloyd Quick told us about www.woot.com. This website lists a special 'bargain-of-the-day', so check it daily. The deals really are good.

Lloyd also mentioned that Ubuntu, the popular Linux distro, is now at Release 8.10. This version will require a CD to install or upgrade. To upgrade from 8.04 to 8.10 get Ubuntu 8.10 alternate ISO and burn it to a CD. Find it at <http://judas.df.lth.se/ubuntu-iso/8.10/>.

Gim Lee told us about Google's free 411 number, 1-800-GOOG-411 (1-800-466-4411). Use it to get business phone numbers for free.

Charlie Patterson and his grandson are trying to play the online video game 'Spore', without success. He suspects that his hardware may need upgrading. The club suggested that he get the system recommended specifications online. I found them at http://www.spore.com/what/specs_spore. Good luck, Charlie.

Ed Terpstra has started using Microsoft's Virtual PC 2007, installing Windows 98 SE as a guest. He said that all went well, but that there was a continuing nagging message, which he disabled. Virtualization was the topic of our club's main meeting this month, presented by Richard Nayman of the Westchester PC Users Group. Read about it in this month's news article 'What Can Virtualization Do for You?' by Jeff Dowley.

Dan Sullivan has also been experimenting with virtualization using VMware - www.vmware.com. Under VMware, guest operating systems are known as appliances, a new term to me. Appliance here means a preconfigured guest operating system, ready to download and start using under VMware. Dan wanted to download the latest Linux Ubuntu appliance, which was available for downloading as a zip file, or as a torrent file, from www.visoracle.com. Jeff Dowley told us that a popular use of BitTorrent is the distribution of new Linux systems. Unlike like the typical download approach using ftp (generally under the covers), BitTorrent uses a democratic approach – multiple users both downloading and uploading parts of the same large file. This allows rapid downloading of large files for many users.

Are you a user of one of the torrent sites, such as BitTorrent? If so, and you're concerned about downloading a corrupt torrent file, Jeff suggests using demonoid - www.demonoid.com. According to Wikipedia, 'Demonoid categorizes torrents under Anime, Applications, Audio Books, Books, Comics, Games, Miscellaneous, Movies, Music, Music Videos, Pictures, or TV. They disallow the uploading of pornographic material and possible viruses from the files uploaded.'

Even though gas prices have fallen significantly from their all-times highs this past summer, a bargain is a bargain. If you want to find the best gas prices in your area, or see a general trend of gas prices nationally, go to www.gasbuddy.com. Thanks to Bob Morales, who showed us this site earlier this year, when prices were climbing daily, and to Bill Marr, who reminded us about this site this month.

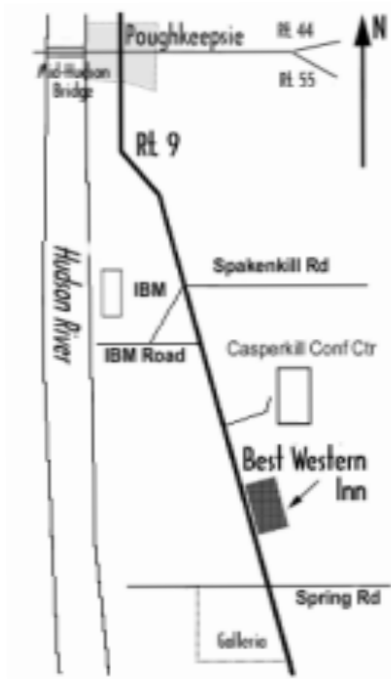
