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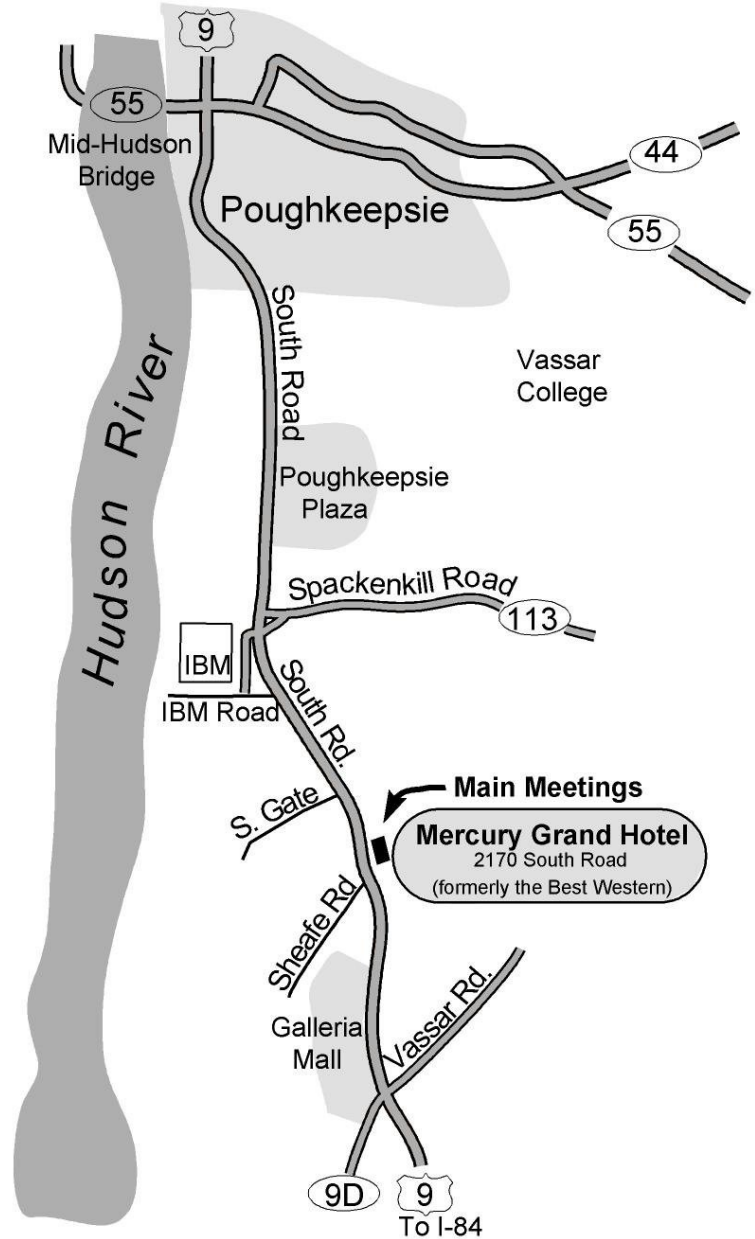

Minutes of the September 2009 MHCUG Board of Directors Meeting

The September meeting of the MHCUG Board of Directors was called to order at 7:11 p.m. by Dan Sullivan, President. This is a regularly scheduled meeting held on the first Thursday of each month in Conference Room B of the Guardian Center at 3 Neptune Road, Poughkeepsie. The meeting is open to the public.

Officers and Board members in attendance were: Jeff Dowley, Dick Kranz, Bob Morales, Ron McDermott, Rolf Nijhuis, Jim Peabody, Ray Polivka, Linda Ritch, Dan Sullivan, Ed Terpstra and Jim Walsh. Harry Elder, Newsletter Editor, was also in attendance.

Dan Sullivan distributed a copy of the Minutes of the August Board meeting and requested that a motion be made that they be accepted. In response Rolf Nijhuis made a motion to accept the Minutes of the March Board meeting as distributed with a change to show an actual starting time of 7:00 p.m. which Dick Kranz seconded. Jim Peabody suggested that such a change should only be made by someone who had been in attendance at the meeting and Dick Kranz responded saying that he had been so present. Ray Polivka pointed to format and content errors in the Minutes as distributed and presented the Board with copies of the Minutes as they had been submitted for publication in the microCHIP. After a review of this copy of the minutes, ten Board members voted to approve the motion, while Jim Peabody elected to abstain.

Jeff Dowley moved that Treasurer's Report be accepted. Rolf Nijhuis seconded the motion and the Board unanimously agreed.

Dick Kranz, VP/Programs, stated that the September meeting would be covered by the VP/Activities, that Ray Polivka was the scheduled presenter for the October meeting, and, after a short discussion, that Jeff Dowley had agreed to develop an eBay presentation for the November meeting.

Linda Ritch, VP/Activities, and Bob Morales described how they planned to conduct the various events at the upcoming Auction. Dan Sullivan asked that he be sent a description of the procedures and a tentative timeline for their portion of the evening, so that he could send a schedule to the membership in his email meeting notification.

To start the committee reports, Jeff Dowley, Membership, reported receipt of 11 annual membership renewals. He reported 82 active members and observed that 125 members were needed to be continuously self-sustaining given the current expenditures.

The Newsletter as represented by Harry Elder and Linda Ritch had no problems to report.

The SIG report indicated that the sessions held at

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the new church meeting site had some seat arrangement and acoustic problems – and that the chairs were somewhat uncomfortable. The Ulster Computing Workshop continues to investigate new meeting locations. Harry Elder observed that the Barnes & Noble in Kingston should be considered since free Wi-Fi was available there. Harry also consented to research Wi-Fi alternatives that might be available at the Guardian Center. Reports for each SIG will be submitted to the microCHIP for publication.

Dick Kranz reminded Dan Sullivan that it was imperative that hotel personnel be contacted soon to secure best-fit room assignments for MHCUG general meetings in the upcoming year.

At 9:53 p.m. Jim Peabody moved that the meeting be adjourned. Ron McDermott seconded the motion which the Board unanimously approved.

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I enjoy reading. I find that reading is intellectually stimulating, broadens my horizons, and provides vicarious experiences. My daughters grew up in a home full of books where they all became avid readers; this substantially contributed to their academic and professional achievements.

My students at LIT should be reading more, but the cost of books is a deterrent, and a trip to the college or public library is often an inconvenience. Many of today's students have grown up in the era of online information, email, Twitter, Facebook, Yahoo!, and Google and to them "online" is their primary information resource. Now there are internet resources where anyone can read literature of any genre, including hundreds of current textbooks, for free. Depending on the rules of the respective websites, these complete books can be read online in a browser window, or downloaded in a variety of formats, often including the popular and universal PDF format.

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I teach economics every semester at LIT and try to instill in my students some of the history, culture, and philosophy that created our economic system. While he is briefly recognized in our economics books, Adam Smith is believed by many to be the father of classical economic philosophy. The full unabridged version of his most recognized tome "An Inquiry into the Nature and Causes of the Wealth of Nations", better known as the "Wealth of Nations" is on my recommended reading list. In the past the students had to compete for the limited number of copies available in the library or purchase a copy, an often difficult task for a cash strapped college student. Today's college student, or anyone for that matter, can simply go online and read it on his monitor, or download a copy for future reference. This is but one example of how technology can be positively used to expand the minds of society, and provoke inspired thought

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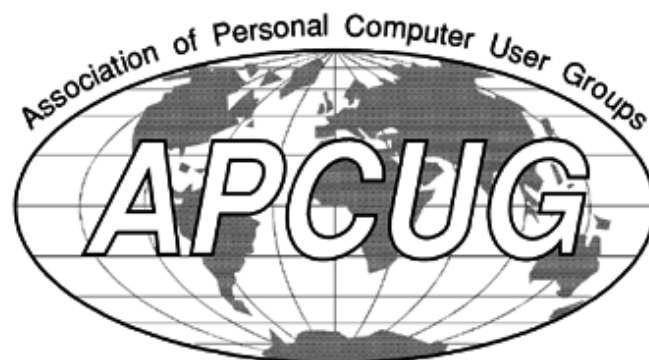
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
