Hour of Code

For the second year, during the second week of December (Computer Science Education Week), the Code.org organization held their worldwide Hour of Code event to get young students exposed to program coding. They provide tutorials for K-12 grades.

code.org, an education nonprofit dedicated to growing computer science education, was founded by Hadi Partovi. To better understand his passion in this organization, go listen to his talk on TED.com <u>Computer science is for everyone</u>". If you go to the <u>code.org</u> webpage, you will see such statements as: 98,438,965 people have tried the Hour of Code. The first Hour of Code last year was used in 127 countries worldwide. Last year, I believe my group was the only group in the Dutchess County to participate in the Hour of Code. This year, groups at Bard College and the school districts of Lagrange and Spackenkill schools participated.

Last year, I took twelve fourth and fifth graders from the Harriet Tubman Academic Skills Center to the Poughkeepsie Adriance Library to participate in the Hour of Code. They all did the "Angry Bird" tutorial and had a great time. One of the things that pleased me was to see several of the students working together. This year, I again took nine students - a second grade student and third and fourth grade students, to the library. This time, one of the fourth graders really caught on during the "Light Bot" tutorial. On the other hand, the second grade student could not handle it. While last year, the first year, the tutorials were a bit limited; this year, there are many more choices provided by more organizations.

If you are interested, you should go to code.org to get an overview, but if you are interested in exploring the various tutorials, go to code.org/ learn. If you scroll left or right, you can view and use the tutorials at one specific level. If you scroll vertically, you may view tutorials for different grade levels and devices. There is a wealth of material there that students can enjoy using and (unknowingly) be exposed to coding. With this growing wealth of material, any parents having young grade-aged school children should take a look at it. In fact, senior citizens and other adults may find the tutorials interesting, instructive, and fun. These tutorials certainly are better than some of those nonsensical "bang, bang, shoot them up," games. Go, take a look and try it. \Box

Microsoft Windows Version 10

- Cortana, a voice recognition service that is Microsoft's response to Apple's voice recognition system Siri.
- Skype which will be integrated across all devices.
- Word, Excel, and Power Point will be enabled on phones and tablets.□

Beware "Microsoft Technical Support" Scam

I hear it all the time. People tell me that they've been called by "Microsoft Technical Support", or similar sounding entities. They're told by the callers that their computers are infected, and that the "support" groups' servers have been getting error reports. Then they're asked, or told, to allow the "support" person to connect to their computers to "help fix" the problem.

As you may already know, or assume from my liberal use of quotes, this is a scam. The real Microsoft® would never call you, unless you've

called them first and asked them for help. Sadly, some of my friends and clients have taken the calls and followed their instructions, which usually involves a credit card payment, and, as I've said, a remote connection.

One of the ways they "prove" that you have errors is to show you your Event logs. In the System area of Windows logs, you'll typically see many warning or errors. These are often timing events that Windows immediately recovers from, and about which average users need not worry. The caller will show you how to access the Event Viewer and then try to alarm you that your system has errors that they'll be happy to fix for a fee. Often, after they've connected to your computer, they'll leave malware or open back-doors that will allow further viruses or surreptitious use of your computer.

This is a typical view from an event viewer. The "errors" are usually recoverable, and transparent to the user.

Beware, this is a scam. I've also received their calls. If you ask them any intelligent question that makes them think they can't take advantage of you, they'll hang up immediately.

Windows 8.1

Downloading, Purchasing and Installing Apps



In addition to being a computer operating system, Windows 8.1 is blurring the line between the old ways of working on a computer and the access to information used by tablets and smart phones. The distribution of apps that perform individual tasks is one of the ways.

In additions to apps that come with the operating system, Microsoft has created a store for apps distribution.

The Store App

The Store app can be found either on the Start screen or on the Task bar.



You access the store app by clicking on the tile/ icon.

When the app opens you have quite a few options to search for items of interest.

Once you find an app of interest, just click on it and on the page that opens you will find information about the app such as number of downloads, reviews with rating and a description of the app. The app might be free, might have a price or it can be downloaded for trial.

Usually a Microsoft account is required. To install the app, just click on the *Install* button.

Maintaining Apps

Periodically, there are updates for apps to either enhance them or fix some problem.

To check for updates go to the Store app.

On the upper right side of the screen, if there are updates available for any of the apps, you will see a link in green



In this case there are updates available for 3 of my installed apps (not distributed with the system.


Clicking on this link displays the 3 apps that are scheduled for an update.

The check mark on the right corner shows that the update is selected to install. It can be unchecked with a right click



The amount of time and download and install takes, depends on the speed of your internet connection, the size of the update and the speed of your computer.

Once the download and install are completed the next message on the screen will be:




You can now close the Store app.

Easy Basic Backups

Unfortunately it is not a perfect world and, as you know, any mechanical device can fail. Because your computer and/or your hard drive can fail, everyone (this means you) needs to take the extra step on a regular basis to make sure that you have a good backup. I am always surprised at the number of people who just don't do backups at all – they will have a real problem if something goes wrong. There have been many "backup" articles written and I would encourage you to read some of them. But the purpose of this article is just to give you the basics first and then you can decide what further steps you need to take and what more information you may need. Here is the "basic backup" information:

- Why do I need to do a backup? In case your computer or hard drive fails
- What is a "backup" anyway? It is simply a copy on another memory device.
- 3. What should I back up? This is good question. I do not backup my entire "C" drive, I only backup those files that are important to me - those files I NEED to keep. I do not backup my software/ programs. For example, I have many documents (files) which I created using the Word program. Well, I can use someone else's Word program and their computer in an emergency to open those files from my backup device. I can also use "Open Office" to open those files. I just need my files which I have backed up and a computer that has Word or is connected to the internet. Get the picture? A backup is also great when you get a new computer and need to put all your files in it. I backup everything in the "My documents" and "My pictures" folders – that is, I backup all the files I have in "My documents" and all "My photos". I do not backup "My music" or "My videos" because I don't have any of those that are important to me. You do NOT have to backup your email or anything that you have saved on the internet cloud (such as on Google Drive, or Dropbox for example). Certainly you may choose to use the internet cloud as your backup device. NOTE: Photos and videos take up MUCH more space than other files -see below.
- How often should I do a backup? As often as needed so that you do not lose anything important. I do a backup every

three or four weeks.

- 5. How do you do a backup? I use either an external hard drive or a thumb drive that plugs into a USB port on my computer. (I don't recommend using CD or DVD disks for doing backups as you will probably run out of space on the disk and have to use too many of them.) I just connect my drive, create a new folder on the drive called "backup 7-31-2014" (the date). Then I just open the Windows Explorer and drag the entire "My documents" folder to that backup folder, and then do the same for "My pictures." It takes about 20 or 30 minutes, but you can do other things on your computer in the meantime. While the files are being copied, you will see a green bar lengthen from left to right until the copy is complete. There is also a time estimate shown which is usually inaccurate.
- 6. How much space do I need on the device? To find out how much space you are using now on your "C" drive for any folder, open up the "Windows Explorer" program and, on the list of folders in the left column, find "My documents". RIGHT-click the mouse on that folder to get a pop-up menu, then left-click on "properties". You will see how much space that folder is taking up and that is how much space you will need on your backup device to copy it. It will also tell you how many files are in that folder. My "My documents" takes up about 300 megabytes. My "My photos" takes up well over 6 gigabytes. So I will count on needing about 7 gigabytes of memory for EACH backup. If you get an external hard drive, pay the extra bucks and get a one-terabyte drive and you will have lots of space. Or you can get a 32 or

a 64 gigabyte thumb drive which, for me, can easily hold my last two backups.

- How many backups should you keep? I only keep the most recent two backups. After I create a new backup, I delete the oldest from the device to save space.
- 8. Anything special about photos? Yes, they take up much more space. On my computer, my pictures take up almost twenty times the space of my documents or other files. So, I handle my pictures differently. I only keep the last two years of pictures on my computer. Every year I copy the oldest photos (from three years ago) to CDs and put them in my photo album. If you have really special photos, you should back them up with your other files and not put them on a CD. I have heard stories that CDs may not last forever and can deteriorate.

Are there other choices or ways of doing backups? You bet. There are programs that you can buy or download from the internet that can automatically do the backups for you. Sometimes backup programs come with the memory device you purchase. There is "the cloud" option too, where you can put your files on the cloud and let that company keep them for you (i.e. such as using Google Drive or Dropbox). But their free space is limited and you may have to pay for more space. Perhaps one of these other ways will be more to your liking, but by all means do your backups. One of the worst-case scenarios is that your computer guits working, you decide to buy a new computer, but you cannot move any of your files to the new computer because you didn't make any backups! Every once in a while, ask yourself: "What would I do if my computer quits working?" \Box

Honey, A Robot Shrunk my Job!


I recently took a day trip alone with my 23-yearold daughter, which gave me the opportunity to find out more about her thoughts on the future. For the last five years she has lived about two hours away, so these opportunities for me to gain insight into her life and attitudes are rare. I was a little surprised to find one of her concerns was that robots would eventually occupy all jobs. She said she and her boyfriend had discussed this and wondered if one day everyone would be unemployed except for those that made robots (and she with a business marketing degree, of course).

I could write off some of her apprehension to the nine months so far spent looking for employment in her field of study, but this concern over technology eliminating jobs is a real issue. Modernization and mechanization have changed the career landscape in the past, but today's changes due to computer and communications technology, combined with increased globalization, may be coming faster than our society can cope with.

Since ancient times, mankind has sought to improve living conditions and decrease the labor required for a fulfilling existence. With the majority of early humans involved in agriculture, innovations were sought to reduce the labor in growing crops. The use of hand tools and plows and of animals in place of human labor allowed fewer people to grow more food. This allowed some who would otherwise be farmers the opportunity

to pursue other professions and develop other innovations.

My daughter is only two generations away from an agrarian life. My father was raised on a farm with no electricity or indoor plumbing. As a young boy, he mostly ate only what his parents obtained from their land and their animals. Over the last 70 years, with tractors and implements, better agricultural science and improved transportation, farm production has improved such that a fraction of the farmers can now provide many times the previous agricultural output. Today GPS-guided tractors optimize the land for planting and farmers can use drones to monitor their crops and livestock. These changes have greatly reduced the labor required to feed the world, providing inexpensive food to a global market. With agricultural labor requirements reduced, rural towns and cities of the Midwest shrank as young people were forced to find work elsewhere.

The Industrial Revolution began 200 years ago, transforming manufacturing and industrial activities. Through most of the last century, the improvements brought by technology reduced the manual labor required to produce products. Though fewer workers were required to produce the same products, new industries were created that provided new jobs. As some classes of occupations became obsolete (like the ice delivery men that stocked the residential ice boxes), others came into being (like refrigerator repairmen). Though the changes to society were great, they came over a number of generations, allowing society to adapt. The electronics and computer revolutions that started at the end of the last century have continued the increases to our productivity, but at a much greater pace. In addition to saving manual labor, computers reduce the mental efforts required in design and production, displacing workers with greater skills. New computer, telecommunications and consumer electronics industries were created as a result of this technology, creating new occupations as others were made obsolete. These profound changes to society now occur in a much shorter time, in a generation or two, or less. When I was growing up, I could not consider a career as a Blockbuster Video sales clerk, as consumer videocassettes had not yet been invented. My daughter watched videos we rented for her as a child; now as a young adult, the video rental stores are gone, and she watches DVDs from the Redbox machine in front of the grocery store or views streaming videos on her iPad. The video rental clerk is an occupation that came and went in my lifetime; Netflix, Hulu and that big red robot dispensing DVDs caused all those jobs to go away.

The video store clerk is the classic example of workers displaced by modern technology (and not replaced elsewhere in a successor industry in the same numbers), but there are plenty of others. Bank employment has been reduced, thanks to automated teller machines (ATMs), online banking and even Internet banks. I don't know if there were ever 400,000 bank tellers employed in the U.S., but today there are that many ATMs here. Now with the ability to deposit a check by taking a picture of it with your smart phone, the need for physical banks, and their branch employees, is reduced further.

Postal and parcel deliveries have been greatly improved by computerization and automation. FedEx, UPS and the other parcel delivery companies have used technology to improve service, open new markets and keep costs down while getting more out of fewer employees. They have taken a lot of business away from the U.S. Postal Service, which has had to automate extensively to compete. I love the "postal robot", the automated mailing kiosk in my local post office. It is available to me at all hours of the day to weigh and mail my letters and packages and sell me postage. It does not require overtime pay or a pension, so I'm sure it reduces the USPS's labor costs.

The state Department of Motor Vehicles is another place where computers should have cut the number of employees required (but considering it is a government activity that might not be the case). Since most simple DMV activities like car registration renewals and address changes can be performed online, most people can avoid for years the unpleasant prospect of visiting the a DMV office in person. Even when you do, you can make an appointment online.

San Diego Gas and Electric used to employ legions of meter readers; now with the new smart meters they have installed over the last few years, all your energy usage is transmitted back to them electronically. Most grocery and general merchandise stores have installed at least a few self-checkout registers, reducing the number of employees needed. A Cupertino, CA hotel is introducing a robotic butler to make deliveries to guests; it motors around like R2-D2. Even NASA

has installed a Robonaut on the International Space Station to help humans work and explore in space.



These days it is hard to think of a job that does not require the use of computers and related technologies. Computers and microcontrollers are being built into everything; these smart, networked devices improve our lives and save us labor. They also may be eliminating a lot of lowerpaid jobs. If a robotic vacuum can clean your floors, you may not need to hire a maid. Some restaurants are introducing tablet-like devices customers can use to order food and pay their bills, reducing the wait staff required.

I think the next big technology innovation will be the autonomous vehicle. The military already has unmanned aerial vehicles for surveillance and munitions delivery; some are remotely piloted, but others are truly autonomous. Once the private sector can legally use drones for business, mass production will make them less expensive and more capable, opening up more possibilities for their use. Small surveillance UAVs may one day replace many police helicopter, patrol car and foot patrols. If Amazon has its way, all your packages will be delivered not by people but by quadcopters.



The self-driving cars being developed by Google and others will really provide benefits to mankind but will also cost jobs. A fully autonomous car would be a great help to those too disabled (or too impaired) to drive, and could have the potential to greatly reduce traffic accidents. Though the technology may already be here, once again the legal and social systems will need time to catch up. Meanwhile, we are getting bits and pieces of the self-driving car now, in the self-parking car and the car that automatically brakes to avoid a collision. Once the fully self-driving car is legal, look for taxi, bus and truck drivers to be in the unemployment lines.



Then the self-driving trucks will transport the raw materials to the robotic factories, so that more robots and self-driving vehicles can be manufactured. \Box




